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100,000 Surgeries— 100,000 Reasons to Keep Going



After living with obstetric fistula for five long years, Hauwa was connected to care by an outreach worker and received the surgery she needed to reclaim her life. Her suffering ended because people like you cared enough to act. A chain of small, individual acts of compassion and generosity made her healing possible. And while Hauwa's story is one of hope, there are still so many women waiting to be found and healed so they can start their futures free from fistula.






Hope Delivered





The Compassion Behind the Care



Honoring Ava's Legacy: A Lifeline for Others

This past year, a deeply meaningful gift arrived at Fistula Foundation—made not in the donor's own name, but in honor of a beloved woman: Ava Yung. As a teacher and single mother to her son Ken, Ava devoted herself to helping others—with genuine kindness, warmth, and sincerity.

In her final years, Ava suffered from a rare neurological disorder that left her incontinent and unable to control her body. Ken, who cared for her, witnessed the isolation and the loss of independence this brought.

Ava's experience echoed the suffering of women in far less resourced places.

In her memory, Ken chose to honor Ava's spirit of hard work and perseverance with a transformative gift to Fistula Foundation from the inheritance Ava left him. "I hope that the donation—my mother's gift—can help those in need, relieve them from suffering and give them a better life," said Ken. Today, Ava's legacy lives on—in every woman who walks out of surgery with the promise of a brighter future.



Where Community and Compassion Meet: The Dr. Mary Cushman Circle

On the quiet, rocky shores of coastal Maine, a legacy of compassion ripples outward. The Dr. Mary Cushman Circle, based in the town of Castine, has supported Fistula Foundation for 14 years, providing more than 30 life-changing surgeries.

Named in honor of Dr. Mary Cushman—a physician from the town who, in 1922, opened a hospital in Chilesso, Angola—the Circle reflects her commitment to healing and community.

The members of the Circle keep Dr. Mary's legacy alive through events like holiday fairs and garden sales. "There is such a need in the world," said treasurer Elise Adams, "It's wonderful to know that your foundation gives women a second chance at life."

A First Paycheck, A Lifelong Promise from Gabrielle

When Gabrielle Kotanidis—a young nurse from Tasmania—received her first paycheck, she wanted it to be more than a milestone. "I thought of it as a promise to myself—that I would use my career to do good," she said.

After reading The Hospital by the River by renowned fistula surgeon Dr. Catherine Hamlin, Gabrielle was moved to act. "I'm a young woman and I could have very easily been born somewhere else in very different circumstances. I could really put myself in their shoes," she said.

That's why Gabrielle chose to donate her first paycheck in its entirety to Fistula Foundation, turning her hard-earned wages into life-changing care for women she may never meet, but will always carry in her heart.





Finding Strength in Giving: Nechama's Journey

Nechama Liss-Levinson—a psychologist from Washington, D.C.—believes in every challenge there is opportunity. So when she began chemotherapy for colon cancer, she turned each round into a moment of giving. "When you volunteer or help others, you begin to see other people's lives and it puts your problems in perspective," she said.

She began treatment in February—the month she'd given birth to both of her daughters. In their honor, and in gratitude for the care she'd received, Nechama gave to Fistula Foundation. "It was important to me. I had so much access to care, and I wanted to help women who otherwise would not have access to care."



A message from Kate:


No Woman Left Behind is in many ways a love letter to people like you who have made our story possible. Since this is the last annual report I'll be a part of, I thought it would be fitting to end with an excerpt from the final page of my book.

Every day life asks each of us: what kind of person am I?

I believe our answer is shown in how we treat other people.

Our donors' selfless empathy is the rocket fuel that drives everything we do. I am inspired by the countless people who give amounts large and small to help women they will never meet, in places they will likely never visit, get their lives back. We share a reverence for the courage of women with fistula, who against the odds, persevere to emerge the heroes in their own story as their despair is turned into hope and healing. I feel so lucky to spend my days surrounded by such compassion and courage.

A woman with fistula is like you and me—she is someone's daughter, sister, wife, aunt, or friend. She wants what you'd want for yourself—a healthy future. Her story is unique and her own. Her struggles are deeply personal. And yet, there is one element that is often the same: surgery provides a hard-won opportunity for a new life—a rebirth. But the promise of curative surgery is a dream for far too many women. It doesn't have to be this way. Together we can create a world where no woman suffers needlessly for trying to bring a child into the world. My hope is that you'll join us in our efforts to ensure that every woman injured in childbirth gets the care she needs to thrive, so that there is no woman left behind.
