A New Life



That is the power of your support. A single surgery changed a woman's whole world. People like you gave Jane Rose a new life.



New Beginnings



In March 2023, I got a call I'll never forget. It was from an advisor to philanthropist MacKenzie Scott, calling to say that Scott was giving us \$15 million. It was the largest gift in the Foundation's history, and it was all the more extraordinary because only about 5% of Scott's gifts have gone to international organizations. We decided to spend down the donation rapidly, because the women we serve are suffering now. We empowered both new and existing partners to find and treat more women. What happened next is astounding, and truly inspiring: We and our partners were able to demonstrate—as never before—our capacity to help women with fistula on a scale that matches the urgency of their suffering. Our goal today, as always, is to help as many women as we can, as quickly and effectively as possible.

Partners and Advocates Take Us Higher





On May 31, 2023, our partner HOPE Hospital in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, opened HOPE Maternity and Fistula Center—the first dedicated fistula center in that country. Fistula Foundation donors supported the construction of this facility, and CEO Kate Grant was on hand to celebrate the momentous achievement. She met with fistula patients alongside Dr. Iftikher Mahmood, founder of HOPE, during a tour of the brand-new, 75-bed facility.





On November 10, 2023, Fistula Foundation hosted a special conversation about Effective Altruism between philosopher Peter Singer and CEO Kate Grant. The event was held at the 92nd Street Y in New York City; Brooke Gladstone of National Public Radio moderated the conversation. During the event, Grant honored Singer with the Allan Rosenfield Award for his visionary leadership, which has transformed countless lives. The award is named for the late Dr. Allan Rosenfield, a renowned figure in the field of women's health, who served on the Fistula Foundation Board of Directors and was the dean of Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health.

New Transformations, Empowered by You



Restoring Smiles, One Stitch at a Time

While most Fistula Foundation supporters will never witness the glowing radiance of a fistula survivor right after her treatment, Linda Chamberlain (above, left) is one of the privileged few who has witnessed this transformation firsthand. Linda and her husband, Will, have been generous supporters of our work since 2011. In fact, the couple introduced us to our partner Kitovu Hospital, where we've funded more than 1,200 surgeries since 2018.

Linda learned about obstetric fistula in 2010, and in 2011 she recruited a group of 12 women to travel to Entebbe, Uganda, to visit fistula patients at Kitovu Hospital. The goal of the visit was to teach pre- and post-op patients how to knit, and to support them in their journey from being a patient to becoming a survivor.

"The women's resilience is incredible. Before they come for care, they're made to feel like nobodies. Here at the hospital, knitting makes them feel special. After their surgery, you can see their resilience shining through!"

Over the past dozen years, Linda has taught about 1,000 patients how to knit, and she is a well-known figure in the fistula ward at Kitovu. Patients lovingly refer to her as "jjaja," which means "grandmother" in Luganda, one of the major languages in Uganda.

In addition to Linda's efforts at Kitovu, she and Will donate proceeds from their blueberry patch—Wilinda Blueberry Patch—in Hood River, Oregon, to support life-transforming fistula surgeries in Uganda and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

"They Call Me Mama, Never Doctor"


Dr. Dolorès Nembunzu was brought up to serve the poorest of the poor. That commitment led her to discover her true calling: She is the first trained female fistula surgeon in her home country, the Democratic Republic of Congo. Building relationships with patients is the highlight of Dr. Dolorès's work. On quiet afternoons at St. Joseph's Hospital, she hops from patient to patient to listen to their stories. The women call her "Mama"; they never call her "Doctor."

Dr. Dolorès also enables surgeries for women who suffer beyond the reach of her care—by donating to Fistula Foundation. "I [give] to provide other women with care, because I too have operated on women for free, thanks to the donations of others," she said.

Baring It All in Support of Fistula Patients

Thomas Francine is an educator who lives in New Jersey and the founder of SkinnyDipDay.org. In his effort to overcome body shame, Thomas tried skinny dipping.

Once he learned about International Skinny Dip Day, he saw an opportunity to help others who experience body shame and to help raise funds for a group of people—fistula patients—who endure an especially devastating form of body shame. In 2019, SkinnyDipDay.org was born, and since then the organization has raised thousands of dollars for Fistula Foundation. Skinny Dip Day takes place annually on the second Saturday in July.

"I've spoken directly to thousands of people about Fistula Foundation. I value that it has a realistic plan to permanently solve a specific problem. And, perhaps most importantly, the cause tugged at my heart strings," said Thomas, who learned about the Foundation from The Life You Can Save, an organization cofounded by Peter Singer.



New Leaders

In 2023, we added new team members to manage our Fistula Foundation Treatment Networks in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Tanzania. In addition, we have expanded our group of medical advisors—expert surgeons who undertake monitoring and evaluation and provide targeted coaching and mentorship across partner hospital sites. These and other leading experts on our team work tirelessly to bring healing to women in need.




Overall Spending in 2023

In 2023, we increased our surgery count by 30%. And we've set our sights on new horizons.
