The Power of a Loving Legacy

Madelaine Einbinder and Leda Rapp are twin sisters who always believed in giving back to their communities, both during their lifetimes and after death. Leda, who made her home in the Lowcountry region of South Carolina, died after a long illness in 2019. In her estate planning, she had named Fistula Foundation as a beneficiary and had selected Madelaine to administer the estate. Today, Leda's legacy endures in the lives of women in Africa and Asia who have benefited from her posthumous giving.

A Story of Healing Starts with You

Your decision to support women with fistula is a selfless act of love. It's powerfully simple, and simply powerful: Thanks to your compassion and generosity, our partners can do the work of transforming a woman's life. Here's how kind people like you are supporting women in need.

Jane Bier has been inspiring students to give back to their communities for nearly two decades. Each year, in her women's studies class at Elyria High School in Elyria, Ohio, she holds a fundraiser to support charities that help women in need. For the past 16 years, Fistula Foundation has benefited from the generosity of Jane and her students.

"I always encourage my students [to see] that they have the power to change themselves, and to effect positive change in the lives of others," said Jane. "It doesn't take a lot to impact a life. By giving a little, you get so much. Without donors, this work can't be done. We all have an obligation to help these women."



Giving That's Good for Business



After reading The Life You Can Save, *by Peter Singer, Andrei Smith* was inspired by Singer's model of Effective Altruism. The idea of giving to causes in which his money would do the most good spoke to Andrei's perspective as a businessman. At the time, he worked as a car salesman in San Jose, California, and for several years he donated 5% of each commission to organizations—including Fistula Foundation—on Singer's exclusive list of effective charities.

Today, Andrei works at a software company, where he encourages colleagues to practice effective giving. "Last year, I did a short presentation to my new company about Effective Altruism and mentioned my connection to Fistula Foundation," said Andrei. Ethical Investment Firm Is Changing Lives in Pakistan

A Birthday Bash That Gives Back



Sheila Bell hosted her first birthday fundraiser to benefit Fistula Foundation in 2004. She had recently learned about the plight of fistula patients, and was inspired to host a luncheon for their benefit. Now in its 17th year, this "labor of love"—as she affectionately calls her annual luncheon—has migrated with Sheila from New Jersey to Florida, and the quest list has quadrupled in size. Sheila, a retired teacher who taught for 40 years, loves educating people about fistula.


"When I give my pitch, people are like 'Oh, wow, that's amazing, I'd love to contribute to that.' It's about the collective effort and how many lives we can change. The power of one is not that great, but the power of many is wonderful." This year, thanks to matching funds, Sheila's birthday fundraiser brought in nearly \$12,000-an amount that will help transform the lives of 20 women.

Ian Alexander, a businessman based in Sacramento, California, was looking for a charitable giving opportunity when he attended a talk at his company by Andrei Smith. (Andrei, a friend of Ian's since high school, now works for the company. See his story on the opposite page.) After the talk, the stars seemed to align for Ian. His wife, Jessie Becker Alexander (shown here with Ian), has a background in women's health, and she started a medical device company to help women who experience postpartum hemorrhages.

Now, twice each month, Ian makes a donation to Fistula Foundation through a donor-advised fund. Paying for women's surgeries has brought a different meaning to everyday work, he explained: "I like that the impact is tangible. Unlike other worthy causes that can't necessarily be solved in a simple way, fistula is a quantifiable problem with a clear solution."

Raising Their Voices for the Voiceless

Because fistula is a little-known condition, it takes the work of many kindhearted and dedicated people to champion the cause of women who suffer in silence. If it weren't for the awareness raised by these trusted ambassadors, we would not be where we are today.

Channeling Empathy into Action

You don't have to be a surgeon or a celebrity to make a difference. Take it from Paul Muli, a pharmaceutical technologist in Kenya whose empathy prompted him to help a woman with fistula.

When Nicaka walked into Paul's pharmacy, he knew she was hiding a painful history. She would regularly visit him for antibiotics, and always seemed distressed.


One day, Nicaka appeared especially sad
and worn out. Paul worked up the courage to
ask her about her health challenges. Nicaka
bravely shared her story: For five years, she
had been silently suffering with fistula. "I
have a big heart, and it was broken over her
condition," said Paul.Today, Nicaka is dry! She and Paul continue
to be advocates for women with fistula,
helping them access care from our partners.
"I'm so thankful to Fistula Foundation for the
work that you are doing, and the many lives
that you're impacting," said Paul.



Determined to find free care for Nicaka, Paul conducted research about fistula and learned about Fistula Foundation. After he reached out to us, our U.S-based team connected him with our team in Kenya. As it turned out, a hospital that could treat Nicaka for free was located less than 3 kilometers (less than 2 miles) from her home. The facility took down Nicaka's information and arranged care for her shortly after Paul contacted its staff.

Surgery Is the Only Cure

We focus on one measurable outcome: the number of women we can heal through life-transforming surgery. Through our comprehensive treatment model, our partners support all of the critical steps along a woman's journey to healing. In collaboration with them, we are working to end obstetric fistula within a generation.



Our Plan to End Fistula

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We sponsor innovative efforts to spread the word about fistula—including radio ads, flyers, skits and comedies at community rallies, and events to enlist male advocates.

Community Reintegration Women re-enter society with confidence,

thanks to programs that offer skills training, financial assistance, and support groups with fellow fistula survivors.

Medical Rehabilitation

After women receive lifetransforming surgery, care providers give them special instructions for recovery, along with access to psychological counseling.

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Fistula Repair Surgery

Expert fistula surgeons, equipped with high-quality tools and empowered with training to hone their skills, provide women with world-class surgical care.



Community Awareness



Trained community health volunteers conduct outreach in rural areas, seeking out women with fistula and referring them for treatment at our partner facilities.

From Patient to Advocate

Women return to their communitiesdry, restored, and hopeful. Many become lifelong advocates who help other women access the treatment they need. And so the cycle of care begins, again.



Through the Fistula Foundation Treatment Network, staff members screen women who may have fistula and connect them to a facility that will best serve their needs.

In 2014, we launched a groundbreaking initiative: a holistic, countrywide fistula treatment network in Kenya. Three years later, we expanded this model to Zambia, and today we are extending it to the Democratic Republic of Congo.

From outreach to surgery to reintegration, the Fistula Foundation Treatment Network brings together hospitals, teams of community health workers, and grassroots groups. With this approach and with your support—we are working to end fistula, one country at a time.



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


